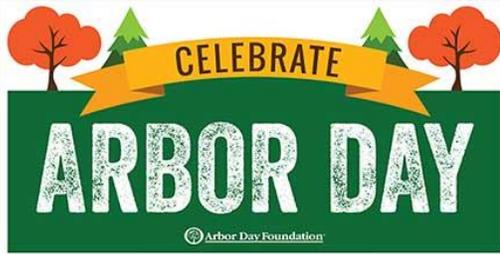

Celebrate Arbor Day Everyday!

Columbus Parks and Recreation:

There are [six State Champion Big Trees](#) in the Columbus parks system. These trees have been identified through the American Forest Big Tree Program for their age, strength and endurance.

- Giant pawpaw trees in the Alum Creek floodplain on the nature trail. Pawpaw is our state native fruit!

North of Columbus:

- [Giant Cottonwood Tree](#) – 136 feet tall, 31 feet around – second largest tree in Ohio and largest Eastern Cottonwood tree east of the Mississippi River

Metro Parks:

Many of the Metro Parks are home to [a variety of notable trees](#). And woodland examples:



Highbanks-

- Grand sycamores along the Olentangy River
- Giant Oaks by the Pool Cemetery on the Overlook Trail, estimated to be 200-300—years old
- Learn about streambank restoration through signage on the Dripping Rock Trail



Sharon Woods -

- Our state tree the Ohio buckeye can be found by the ranger station
- The Edward Thomas Trail is home to many large oaks - swamp white oak, chinkapin, and white oak. One that fell along the trail was aged at 191 years old! (Think of all it has seen since 1830!!)
- Tulip trees are growing by the office. Their leaf buds look like duckbills and they have gorgeous flowers in the springtime.



Three Creeks –

- Grove of conifers along the Alum Creek Trail that were planted in Columbus’s Tree City Campaign

Walnut Woods -

- Great forest of pine trees in the Tall Pines area were originally planted as a part of the Eastside Nursery
- Massive Pin Oak on the Pin Oak Trail measures 110 feet tall, 19 feet in circumference and is estimated to be 150-200 years old. <https://www.metroparks.net/blog/tidbits-to-discover-on-your-park-travels/>
